This enables us to do something, and to do it very well.


It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest.

The Book of Acts

With the Summer upon us, it’s the season of cinema blockbusters, and Hollywood has put out the usual collection of sequels. Many people consider The Book of Acts to be Luke’s sequel to his first blockbuster hit *The Gospel According to Luke*. Luke ended his Gospel account with a Hollywood ending to beat all endings: As people looked on, Jesus lifted up His hands and blessed them, and was lifted up to heaven! Roll credits! Wow!

And sure enough, Acts picks right up where Luke left off, and Jesus declared that His followers would be His witnesses. The plot twist to draw you in is that Jesus said they'd be His witness not just in Jerusalem, which is what they probably figured they'd be doing, but into Samaria (a very undesirable place for a Jew) and even to the ends of the earth. And wouldn't you know it, that's exactly what the rest of Acts is about.

Annual Conference Report

“One Beneath the Cross” was the theme of the Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference (BWC) of the United Methodist Church May 30-June 1. But the more than 1,200 lay and clergy members in attendance spent much of their time on the divisive issue of the church's position on homosexuality.

At a lengthy Clergy Session on the first day of the Conference, Bishop LaTrelle Easterling issued a “ruling of law” reflecting the Book of Discipline that two individuals whom the Board of Ordained Ministry had approved were not eligible for ordination and commissioning because they are “self-avowed practicing homosexuals” and were each married to a person of the same gender. At the following morning's session, members were briefed that the denomination will hold a specially-called session of the General Conference in February 2019 to address the issue of homosexuality, including same-gender marriage, the ordination of gays and lesbians, and language in the Book of Discipline that calls homosexuality “incompatible with Christian teaching”. The Council of Bishops will present to the delegates of this special session a One Church Plan that, if approved, would allow each church and annual conference to decide how they will deal with these matters. The members to the BWC voted 310 to 233 to endorse the One Church Plan.

As part of the holy conferencing, members approved a \$18.7 million budget. For the seventh year, apportionment spending in the BWC will remain flat between \$14.1 and \$14.3 million. Approximately 10.5 percent of the budget will be directed to missions and ministries – beyond the amount provided by local congregations. In addition, members adopted a new BWC mission statement: “to inspire and equip local faith communities to develop disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world”. The work of the BWC was done in a setting of worship with many inspirational messages, presentations, and teachings. Bishop Easterling preached on the need

for unity and love – “a love that embraces those on the opposite political, economic and theological side”. At the Laity Session, Barb Lemmel, director of Tending the Fire, spoke about “courageous leadership in anxious times”; Rev. Rick Vance of the General Commission on United Methodist Men shared resources about domestic violence, saying that “men need to speak out so that our churches and homes are safe places”. Rev. Shively Smith of Wesley Theological Seminary led a Bible study on Ephesians 4: 1-6, encouraging those attending to “imagine what connections and oneness look like”.

Members also heard a report on the work of 376 BWC churches on the Call to Action for Racial Justice. Connectional Ministries honored several people for their work in the areas of Leader Development, Young People’s Ministry, Abundant Health, Advocacy in Action, and New Faith Expressions. The BWC received thanks for its 20 years of paying 100 percent of its apportionments, for its gifts to the Black College Fund, and for its support of Africa University in Zimbabwe which has made it possible for 7,000 students to graduate from this United Methodist School.
