Lent with Peter: A Journey We Share

This Lent, we trace the steps of Peter, Jesus' close confidante. In him, we glimpse both unshakeable faith and wobbly moments, dear friendship and denial, unwavering conviction and fleeting wanderings. Peter's journey reflects our own - the ongoing quest to navigate life while chasing a flicker of divinity.

Guided by the hymn "Come Thou Fount," we'll sing our way through Peter's story, binding our restless hearts to God. Faith, we affirm, is a constant journey, not a stagnant destination. Wandering is exploration, not necessarily abandonment of or distance from God.

Peter embodies this. He drops his nets, walks on water, stumbles to the empty tomb, swims to meet the risen Christ. He stumbles, falls, yet keeps yearning, searching, loving. In him, we see God's embrace for the imperfectly faithful, for they are the ones God calls.

Lent is a time for reflection. It is a time to examine our lives and our hearts as we prepare to walk towards Easter.



Some traditions emphasize sacrifice during Lent; the practice of fasting, or perhaps giving up something worldly as part of the resetting of our thinking. But we can also consider in a larger sense how we can refocus and redirect our energies, our resources, and our priorities to better align ourselves with God.

At EUMC, our Admin Council decided to hold our stewardship drive during Lent. The United Methodist Church believes "Together We Do More." In November and December, we presented Ministry Moments during our services, when speakers reminded us of all the important ways we engage with our community. Here at Eastport UMC, we are continually growing and developing our capacity to **exemplify God's love, so that we can extend that love** in the world.

Church budgets contain all of the regular, mundane expenses, such as utilities, staff salaries, and physical repairs. But we really want to emphasize what our gifts can do in the world around us, to make all people feel included, valued, and surrounded by the love of Christ.

Please join us as part of your personal Lenten reflection to consider whether you can increase your financial support of the church and its missions. We have set a budgetary goal of a 10% increase in annual financial giving. As United Methodists, we pledge to support our church through our *prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness*. The Board of Child Care of the United Methodist Church is a proud Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA) training site, and thanks to a grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), is offering YMHFA training at no cost to the community. It is the goal of the Board of Child Care to increase awareness surrounding youth mental health needs and the resources available to help.

This is an 8 hour class that examines typical adolescent development (12-18 years old) and a plan to assist youth in crisis and non-crisis situations.


