We want to extend our table and increase our impact, as a body of faith committed to following Jesus and improving the lives of others, but this is difficult to do relying on reserves. This is where good stewardship from each of us comes in. It allows us to extend our table and make a real difference. We have amazing ways to connect with our neighbors, fully funding the budget will help us continue that, but we have even bigger dreams!

General Conference Update



This week brought exciting news from the UMC General Conference, a giant leap forward for inclusivity that aligns with our core values here at Eastport

UMC: radical welcome and love for all. Remember how discouraged we all felt after the 2019 conference's discriminatory decisions? Well, this year, we have much to celebrate!

Here's a glimpse of the positive changes:

- Harmful Language Eradicated: We finally said goodbye to discriminatory language that excluded LGBTQ+ individuals from ministry! This victory, decades in the making, removes a huge barrier to inclusion.
- Clergy Equality: Clergy who perform or officiate same-sex weddings can now do so without fear of punishment.
- Local Church Autonomy: Churches that choose not to perform same-sex marriages are still respected. This change allows individual congregations to follow their own faith journeys.
- Funding Ban Lifted: Remember the "mythical gay agenda" excuse used to block funding for suicide prevention among LGBTQ+ youth in 2016? That's finally over! This funding will make a world of difference in supporting young lives.
- Traditional Plan Rejected: The harsh penalties proposed for LGBTQ+ clergy and those officiating same-sex marriages were thankfully completely removed. This creates a more just and compassionate environment for everyone.
- No More Restrictions: Restrictions on LGBTQ+ clergy ordination have been eliminated! This opens doors for qualified individuals based on their faith and calling, not who they love.

These changes mark a historic moment for the UMC, moving us closer to a truly inclusive and loving church. Importantly, these updates allow individual churches and clergy to follow their faith journeys while respecting the beliefs of others. While much has been removed, we still have work to do in adding positive and affirming language. One bite at a time.

Here at Eastport UMC, we remain deeply committed to actively welcoming and affirming everyone, regardless of sexual orientation, gender identity/expression. I'm so incredibly grateful for all who've led us in this direction, especially my predecessor Pastor Michelle Mejia.

Join Us for This Performance

"If you could know for one moment how it is to live in our bodies within the world, if you could know..."

This is one line of text from the cantata CONSIDERING MATTHEW SHEPARD, to be performed on May 17th (7:30) and 19th (3pm) at the Kauffman Theater on the campus of AACC. (see flyer). I will conduct an instrumental ensemble of eight and a chorus of 50-55 members, joined by numerous soloists and enhanced by staging and projections. This is a piece describing Matthew, his life, his dreams and the events of that fateful day. The text is by many different authors and includes thoughts of those who were the locals, who viewed the place of execution, who feared they might be like those men who murdered Matthew Shepard. It is a poignant piece in which four members of our own choir - Charlotte Kerns, Mae and Les Johnson, Bill Riggs – will sing.

In conjunction with these performances, a Townhall will take place on Thursday May 16 at 7pm in the Kauffman Theater—25 Years after Laramie: Considering Matthew Shepard and Our World. Cathy Renna - National LGBTQ Task Force (thetaskforce.org), Communications Director for the National LGBTQ Task Force, will be joined by Dr. Heather Rellihan (AACC Gender Studies) and Dr. Forrest Caskey (AACC Faculty Adviser to LGBTQ Student Group) to be the panel/facilitators for this event. Some short excerpts from the show as well as

pictures (projections) of Matt that are used in the show will be shared. This is a FREE event

Tickets for the cantata can be purchased by reading the QR code on the flyer below, or at the door. (Please specify that you are supporting AVAS.) There will be a talkback after the performances. This is not the type of presentation that people usually get up immediately and leave. I encourage you to attend this event and get inside the feelings of Matthew, his parents and those who felt the sting of this heinous act that extinguished a young life. Hopefully, humanity will keep evolving into an accepting society, respectful of the value and uniqueness of each person and their contribution to the ethos of the world. ~ JoAnn Kulesza



Garden & Maintenance News

Thanks to everyone who helped with our Greenscape day: Mike Keller, Anne Heald, Sam Coates, Donald Cooney (who carried about 50 bags of heavy mulch!), Tyrone Brown, my husband ,Jerry, and Tonya DeMedici. We didn't get everything done so if you have some time to help, please contact us.

This month we had a leak from a dehumidifier which damaged part of the floor in the basement. Pastor Chris cleaned it up and Jerry and I installed new drip pans and water alarms under the 5 dehumidifiers. We cleaned out the tubing and water reservoirs too. This is the second time this has happened. Some floor tiles still need to be replaced. We reinstalled a toilet paper holder, fixed accordion wall in sweater room, put dirt in hole near downspout, touched up nicks and paint on new wall, picked up trash and cut the grass several times (we now have a yard service once a month when we are out of town. Yah!), filled low spots with dirt in yard, cleaned out pop up drains in yard, replaced Easter banner outside with regular one, and watered plants.

We are very pleased to have been awarded a big grant by the Methodist Church B-W Conference for a new ramp to the lower level and some equipment for the basement rooms. It will be wonderful to have access for those with mobility issues. We are getting estimates for this work.

Please keep all our workers and volunteers in your prayers to stay safe while they do repairs on our church. If anyone has any extra time and can help with church gardens, lawns, and maintenance, we would greatly appreciate it.
